Assembling offerings such as these, along with managing our historic structures requires a very substantial commitment of time and energy on the part of the Association's Board of Directors.

We would most eagerly accept the help of volunteers to assist in any number of ways, and at any level of involvement. Treasurer's Report

At the mid-point of our fiscal year, which runs from October 1 through September 30, our finances continue to be in sound condition. This year's Operating Budget is \$47,000. At the end of March our operating income was \$24,240 or 52% of budget. Our operating expenses were \$17,370 or 37% of budget. These figures are typical for this time of year. Although operating expenses show a relatively low percentage at mid-point, they will increase significantly during the summer visitation season. We expect that the Operating Budget will be slightly in the black at the end of the fiscal year.

As mentioned in previous newsletters, WLHH keeps money for day-to-day operations (the Operating Budget) separate from money held for special purposes such as the Participating in the Past Program, the LCHIP II project, long-term maintenance of the buildings, and upcoming deaccession costs. The money for these special purposes is held in several Funds – the most recent being the Lear House Deaccession Fund, which was established in March of this year. Altogether the Funds contain \$137,000.

As we move into the future we believe we are on a sound financial footing. The Operating Budget continues to be in the black. Our Funds contain sufficient money to meet anticipated special purpose expenses. Management will continue its focus on maintaining tight fiscal control.

Buildings & Grounds

After completion of the 2016 LCHIP grant the committee has been considering other possibilities to improve and maintain the buildings. Some new grant possibilities are under consideration such as painting the entrance hall of the Wentworth Gardner house, and foundation repairs to the Warehouse.

The committee has also been working on the deaccession of the Tobias Lear house and has provided floor plans and elevations for the sale packet. A plot plan has been ordered to determine the exact boundaries of the property. Additionally, an archeological study is being arranged to determine the location of the former rear addition to the Lear House as well as locating and excavating the site of the original privy. It is anticipated that the archeology will take place in May prior to opening day, so we will keep you posted as this should be a very interesting opportunity to stop by and learn more about the history of the Lear family!
